

Laurel native serving aboard USNS Comfort supports Continuing Promise 2025

MILLINGTON, Tenn. – Petty Officer 1st Class Samuel Olaitan, a native of Laurel, Maryland, with hometown ties to Lagos, Nigeria, is deployed aboard the U.S. Navy hospital ship, USNS Comfort, supporting Continuing Promise 2025.

Continuing Promise 2025 is an exercise focused on humanitarian assistance, medical readiness, and goodwill with six nations in the Caribbean, Central America and South America. The exercise runs from June to August, and more than 1,000 personnel participate.

Health services offered during Continuing Promise 2025 include general surgery, dental screenings and treatment, preventive medicine, medical evaluation, public health training, veterinary care and vision screening.

Olaitan graduated from Oba Abass High School in Lagos, Nigeria, in 2015. Olaitan also places a great deal of value on education, as evidenced by him earning an associate degree in information technology programming from Howard Community College, a bachelor's degree in business administration from Trident University and a master's degree in healthcare administration from the University of Phoe-

Unsung Heroes: Rethinking the Role of Community Cat Feeders

In neighborhoods across the country, community cats quietly exist on the edges of our awareness. And just as quietly, a small group of dedicated individuals shows up—every single day—to care for them. These are the community cat feeders.



You might recognize the scene: someone walks through a back lot or overgrown alley just as dusk falls, a grocery bag in hand. A handful of cats emerge—some bold and vocal, others watchful and wary—as food is laid out. It's a simple, compassionate act repeated in thousands of places every evening.

But who are these feeders, really? Often dismissed as eccentric or overly emotional, they're seldom appreciated for what they truly are: compassionate people stepping into a gap where no system exists. Rarely do they begin with a plan. Most start with one hungry cat, and one kind-hearted act. Over time, more cats appear, and the feeder's commitment deepens—not out of obligation, but because they feel responsible. The feeder grows to love the cats and wants the best for them.

Yet despite their impact, many feeders that don't have the support of a group like Beltsville Community Cats operate in a strange space—highly visible when someone wants to complain, but largely unsupported when they need help. They pay for food, sometimes for vet care, and often take on the responsibility of neutering. Their role can grow overwhelming, financially and emotionally. And when expectations aren't met—by neighbors, local authorities, or

even animal lovers—feeders are often unfairly blamed.

The truth? Feeders are not the cause of the community cat problem. They are a response to it. Their presence signals a failure in public systems to provide meaningful, humane, and sustainable solutions.

So, what if we changed the way we view and support them?

What if cat feeders, like those in Beltsville Community Cats, had access to community food banks, low-cost veterinary services, and spay/neuter vouchers? What if they were connected through neighborhood networks that helped share information, reduce duplication, and flag urgent needs? With training in basic animal care and health monitoring, they could become early responders—helping to prevent suffering and control populations before things spiral.

We don't need to ask more of feeders. We need to ask more of the systems that should be supporting them.

By integrating feeders into a broader community cat strategy, we can turn an overburdened informal role into a recognized, resourced, and respected part of the solution.

Feeding may start with kindness—but it shouldn't end in burnout. Let's build the infrastructure that lets their compassion go further.

When a Bathroom Renovation Goes Wrong: A Cautionary Tale of Poor Planning and Worse Execu-

What was supposed to be a sleek, modern update to a tired bathroom turned into a costly disaster for the Jackson family of Collesville. Their story is a stark reminder of how easily a renovation can go off the rails when expectations aren't grounded in solid planning, or in reliable contractors

The Dream

Like many homeowners, the Jacksons were eager to transform their dated 1980s bathroom into a contemporary retreat. "We had Pinterest boards, color schemes, everything," said Erica Jackson. "We imagined floating vanities, frameless glass showers, and matte black fixtures. We were excited to invest in something beautiful."

They hired a contractor recommended by a neighbor. Someone who seemed competent but didn't have a website or portfolio. "That should've been the first red flag," Erica admits.

The Reality

From day one, problems mounted. The demolition crew arrived two days late with no explanation. When they finally got started, they cracked a water pipe that flooded the hallway. "The plumber they brought in wasn't even licensed," said Erica. "We found out after the fact."

Then came the tile. The Jack-

sons had chosen an elegant porcelain tile, but what was delivered didn't match. "It looked like something from a discount warehouse-completely wrong color and texture," said Erica. Despite their objections, the contractor insisted on using it, claiming it was "close enough."

Perhaps the most frustrating failure was the installation of the shower. Improper waterproofing led to leaks that soaked the subfloor. Within two weeks, mold began forming under the vanity. "We could smell it before we could see it," said Erica. "That's when we knew we had a serious problem."

Cutting Corners, Paying the

An independent inspector later found that corners had been cut at every step. The electrical outlets weren't up to code. The vanity wasn't secured properly. And worse, the contractor had used drywall in areas where moistureresistant board was required.

The Jacksons spent over \$15,000 on the renovation and are now facing another \$12,000 in repairs. "We're basically paying twice for one bathroom," said Erica.

What Went Wrong?

The Jacksons' story isn't uncommon. "People often get seduced by low bids and promises of fast timelines," said Mike Elston, a home inspector with 20 years' experience. "But if a contractor can't provide credentials, references, and a detailed plan, walk away."

Some key lessons from their experience include:

- Always verify licensing and insurance.
- Get everything in writing, including materials, timelines, and penalties for delays.
- Don't pay in full upfront.
- Have a contract reviewed by someone who knows construction law.
- Ask to see prior work or speak with past clients.

Moving Forward

Though burned, the Jacksons haven't lost hope. They've since hired a licensed contractor to redo the job correctly and have filed a complaint with the state licensing board. "We want others to learn from our mistake," Erica said. "The bathroom of your dreams shouldn't become your worst nightmare.

Bottom line? A bathroom renovation is more than just new tiles and faucets—it's about trust, craftsmanship, and careful planning. Skip those steps, and you may find yourself literally flushing money down the drain.



Protecting Beltsville from car theft, break-ins, and vandalism

In recent months, our community has been hit with a crime wave, much of it committed by juveniles. Hopefully, you personally have not been a victim, but too many of our neighbors have. Prince George's Police are doing what they can to prevent this crime and catch the perpetrators. In the last two years, Delegates Peña-Melnyk, Barnes and Lehman and I have worked with our legislative colleagues to help recruit more police, strengthen laws against violence, and increase accountability and rehabilitation for perpetrators, particularly juveniles. But, given the recent crimes in Beltsville, the Delegates and I are working with police, prosecutors, Juvenile Services, Councilman Tom Dernoga, and our colleagues to figure out what more we can do. Please let us know your ideas.

Resources for Impacted Federal Workers

The Maryland Department of Labor is accepting applications for the Federal Worker Emergency Loan Program, which offers a \$700 no-interest loan to Maryland residents who were recently terminated from federal employment due to mass layoffs, relocations, or closures and are experiencing financial hardship. Loans must be repaid within 180 days, with a



She brings with her three years of retail management experience, more than 20 years in office management, and a background as a trained nurse and midwife — having even delivered three of her four grandbabies.

When I asked why they chose to run a grocery store, they explained, "We've always felt held back by the corporate structure. Being an independent operator/owner has allowed us to put our own stamp on the business and create a very family-friendly atmosphere. We love the community we're in and work with several organizations."

As with any new business, there were challenges. According to Sharon, the biggest hurdle was name recognition — getting the word out about the value Grocery Outlet offers. But there were bright spots, too. "Our greatest experience has been being out and about in the community and having people recognize us and what we stand for," Sharon said. "Also, being on a billboard — who would have thought!"

Tech Sense By John Bell

eBooks and Readers 2025

It is nearly July and that means summer vacation. Vacation for many of us means time to read for fun and relaxation.

It has been more than 5 years since I have covered eBook formats. I covered readers briefly during the last holiday season, so I will cover a little more detail this time around. I also covered some of my favorite Science Fiction eBooks (and movies) last July in a column titled Potpourri. I will skip them this time. However, I suggest that you visit Project Gutenberg to find free-to-read classics to read as you rest on the beach or in a hammock.

eBook Formats

Many file formats designed for eBooks have come and gone over the years. The Portable Document Format (PDF) has remained the most popular format. PDF documents can be easily printed and read from most computers and rendered to appear as the printed page. Most of my eBooks I have downloaded as PDF files because I can view then on almost every device I have including my phones, tablets, and computers. The documents also print on every printer I own. The PDF format was created by Adobe but has been an industry standard for many years.

MOBI was an early format adopted by Amazon as the basis for the Kindle format. Rarely found now Amazon replaced the MOBI format with the "AZW3" format (sometimes called "Kindle8"). Kindle holds a large market share for both eBooks and readers making "AZW3" a dominant format for eBooks.

Used on many readers, the ePUB format is the official standard of

the International Digital Publishing Forum. ePUB is the most widely based e-book standard that is based on XML files as opposed to PDF files. ePUB provides support for audio book overlays allowing the audio to be synchronized with the current page in the book. Most eReaders handle ePUB directly, but the Kindle can't handle compressed (zipped) ePUB files and recommends they be tested before use.

Of course, two formats aren't enough because of comic books. Most modern comic books are in color with individual blocks showing both image and text. These images vary in size with multiple images on a page. It is common to show only one or a few images on electronic devices. This reflects the size of the viewing device. To work with comics the publication format collects each image, compresses them and stores them in a file archive. The file extensions identify the archiving and compression format. There are two popular formats in use. The CBZ format uses the free and open Zip file standard and the CBR format uses the proprietary RAR format. The other identifiers are CB7 for 7z format, CBA for ACE format, and CBT for Tar format. The images within the archive file can be stored in various formats as well. The most common are PNG, and JPEG/JPG. Although GIF, BMP, or TIFF can also be used. These are all common digital image file formats, each with different advantages and disadvantages.

Readers

EReaders are the hardware devices used to read eBooks. An eReader can be a dedicated hardware device or software running

on a computer, tablet, or phone. Most dedicated eReader devices use something called an eInk display. These black and white displays use very little power allowing eReaders to remain charged for days or weeks instead of hours. Some eReaders provide a headphone jack to stream music and have the reader read books to you aloud. There are various methods of adding books to the eReader. Some like the Kindle use Wi-Fi or mobile connections. Others use a connection to a computer to add books previously downloaded by the computer.


The Amazon line of Kindle readers are the most popular with many reviewers saying the current Kindle Paperwhite is the best product on the market. Kindle gives access directly to purchase ebooks from Amazon or access book through Prime or a subscription plan. You can also use the Libby application to borrow books from our local library. You must have a library card to do this. Amazon has recently started to sell color eInk versions of their Kindle readers.

Rakuten Kobo, considered by many reviewers to be the next best eBook reader, is an independent manufacturer, and doesn't lock you to the Amazon universe. Kobo primarily supports EPUB and PDF formats but it's possible to use conversion programs to read Kindle books.

The Barnes and Noble Nook is still around but has dropped in popularity. Ignored by most reviewers, the nook only represents about 10% of overall eBook sales. Nook has a number of models, some built by manufacturers like Lenovo. Some

Staying Cool and Safe from Heat-Related Incidents

When extreme heat weather events bring unsafe and potentially fatal temperatures, it is critical to stay out of the heat, stay cool, and stay hydrated. The permanent cooling center for Beltsville is the Vansville Community Center, located at 6813 Ammendale Road, Beltsville, 20705. Additionally, the Laurel-Beltsville Senior Activity Center, located at 7120 Contee Road, Laurel, 20707, will also serve as a cooling center. Please see the list of cooling centers in District One and throughout the County here: https://tinyurl.com/D1Cooloff.

Unfortunately, six Maryland residents died from heat-related incidents in 2024, four of whom were Prince George's County residents. Let's keep our neighbors and families safe. First, make sure you know the warning signs of heat-related health issues. These issues include heat cramps, heat exhaustion, and heat stroke. Heat cramps manifest as muscle pain and extreme cramping. Heat exhaustion manifests as dehydration, cool, moist, pale, or flushed skin, extreme weakness, nausea, headaches, vomiting, and faintness. Heatstroke manifests as body temperatures over 105 degrees Fahrenheit, dry and red skin, a rapid and weak pulse, fast and shallow breathing, convulsions, disorientation, delirium, and potentially heat-

induced coma. To address heat cramps, stop all activities, find a rest area, drink fluids (avoid caffeinated products and alcohol), and wait for a few hours before resuming activity. Heat cramps can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If you experience heat exhaustion again, drink fluids, find a cool, shaded resting place, and seek medical attention if symptoms do not improve within one hour. If you are facing heat stroke, cool off with cool, wet towels to lower your body temperature and call 911. Be careful when giving fluids; do not give fluids if the victim refuses water, vomits, or has fainted.

Here are suggestions to help cope with extreme heat. Drink plenty of fluids while avoiding alcohol, caffeine, and overly sweet beverages. Wear loose-fitting, lightweight, and light-colored clothing. Avoid direct sunlight, wear sunscreen, and stay in cool, shaded locations whenever possible. Avoid consuming salty products or items that lead to dehydration. If you have to engage in physical activities, do so during the morning and evening when temperatures are cooler, and take breaks to cool off. Also, be sure to protect your pets by keeping them cool, well-hydrated, and never leaving them in a parked vehicle. Stay safe and take these precautions to protect yourself, your family, and your animals during periods of extreme heat.

nix. Olaitan is currently pursuing a Doctorate of Strategic Leadership at Liberty University.



are more like tablets, and some models include color capabilities.

Boox is a popular independent maker of eBook readers, offering both regular black and white readers and color products. Many reviewers write nice things about these readers, but my observation is that many actual users complain about the quality of the devices and customer service.

Color Readers, Tablets, Phones

The latest trend is now color readers. Color readers address the issue of reading magazines and comics, which require color to get the full value of their content. Recently, color eInk has become viable for eReaders. They provide the long battery life of the black and white eReaders but provide color images and text. However, the color display costs more and page turning, screen update response, seems to be slower.

Android or Apple tablets have become a popular alternative to eReaders. All current tablets support ereading software supporting the Amazon Kindle and the Barnes and Noble Universe. Google Play Books also provides a very good reader for both Android and Apple phones. I find my wife does a lot of her reading on her phone. She also

uses a Kindle device, and the software tracks her reading progress on both devices so when she switches her device the software automatically returns her to where she left off.

Reader Software

I have tried several reader applications, and I find I prefer the Google Play reader app that works for both regular books and comics. It also works on my tablet, my phone, and my computer.

Android also includes a number of choices for PDF readers. But, unlike an eBook reader, a pdf viewer doesn't keep a page mark tracking where you left off. I use Kindle software on my tablet for

books I acquire through Amazon, so I don't need to worry about the file conversion. I also find that the library program Libby also works well with the Kindle app.

Most of the books I acquire are in PDF or EPUB formats. I store these on my Google Drive so I can access them from any device, my phone, my tablet, or one of my computers. Most of today's computers and devices have PDF readers built in.

Tools for viewing other formats are easily found. Amazon makes its Kindle software available for Windows, macOS, Android and iOS. Boox, Nook, and Google also provide software readers for most platforms. A simple search will find many others that are independent of manufacturers, and bo

Personal Choices

My personal choice for reading is a tablet. I have used many tablets over the years, and I find a 7-to-8-inch tablet fits me best. I like the color ability, since I enjoy reading both comics and magazines. I only get 8 to 12 hours before the tablet needs a recharge, but I can also watch movies, check email, and do all of the other things a tablet provides.

I have both Kindle and Google Books apps on the tablet, and I have tried several others. I personally find the Kindle app to be better suited for how I read. The Google Play App, however, does a better job with the EPUB books I have. A few months ago, I read 18 EPUB books in a month on my tablet with the Google Play App. I borrowed and read a single book on Kindle. Both Amazon and Google provide tools allowing me to upload books from my collection into the apps. I can also access books from my cloud storage and read them that way.



Reminder: Fireworks are illegal

The Prince George's County Fire/EMS Department encourages residents to attend approved public fireworks displays offered throughout the County, handled by a licensed fireworks professional. While certain types of fireworks may be legal in some neighboring jurisdictions, Prince George's County has banned the sale, possession, and use of all kinds of fireworks, including sparklers, by residents in hopes of preventing needless accidents and injuries.

Under Prince George's County law: It is illegal for any person to manufacture, possess, store, offer for sale, expose for sale, sell, discharge, use, burn, or explode any fireworks in Prince George's County, Maryland, except that an authorized display may be conducted by a licensed fireworks shooter. So much has happened in this month, which I feel is one of the shortest months of the year. Yes, it has 30 days, but still time seems to go so fast. So let me get right into it. This month, the week of June 13, history was made in the Eastern Caribbean when an Air Peace Boeing 777-300 flew directly from the Nigerian capital, Abuja, to the RLB Airport in St. Kitts, a ten-hour flight. I proceeded to ask him a question and based on his response; it was who I thought it was. As he responded to my question, he asked me my name. I told him, "I doubt you will remember my name from ISI. Have not seen you since about 1983." His mouth opened wide in awe. His face lit up with a curious smile, as I guess he started going through a database of faces from school days.

A few days after that, I went to a graduation party for a friend's son in Southlake, Dallas and ran into a 'big brother' I had not seen since 1978 or so. I had no memory of me, but he remembered me vividly. We grew up at church and as young people, we enjoyed skipping the service to play in the parking lot, which had a lot of fruit trees. Folks around us were stunned at the revelation.

So, I say all this to say that the world is indeed very small. You just never know how you are connected. There is no room for all this hatred and bitterness that we spew on each other.

If you watch Nigerian movies, history will be made on July 6th in Greenbelt, when a very popular new movie, 'Aso Ebi Diaries' premieres at the Greenbelt Cinema at 129 Centerway. The event starts at 6 pm with a red carpet and the actual film screening starts at 7 pm. It marks the start of Nigerian movies being shown at the movies here in the USA. If you are able to, please go experience the richness of the Nigerian culture. Do a google search about the word, "aso ebi." Well, have a nice one and happy Independence.
